FROM RABBI GOLDSTEIN'S DESK

Hi everyone! I am so excited to be writing my first Kol article as the Senior Rabbi of Temple Beth

El. It's a bit surreal to be back in Rochester after all this time. It just goes to show the wisdom behind the Yiddish expression, "Der mentsh tracht, un Gott lacht, man plans, and God laughs." We never know where our lives are going to lead us. We think of our plans and our lives as linear. We like to think we have a plan, but that is far from the truth. We never know where this life will take us.

I know it's a cliché, but so many things are different here in Rochester, while at the same time, it seems as if nothing has changed. The names might be different, there may be a few more nice restaurants (and about 30 Starbucks), but Rochester has managed to maintain the same beauty it's always possessed. Being back, I realize the awesome responsibility of stepping into the role of Senior Rabbi. I am excited and nervous to be picking up the mantle here at TBE. There is no way to know what the future holds, but I am encouraged and hopeful about being back here. I feel blessed to be able to give back to the Rochester Jewish community that has given me so much.

Every community is different, and everyone has a different idea of what a Rabbi should be. I know that I might not be what everyone envisions when they picture a Rabbi. I can be a bit informal. I don't sleep in a suit, and I enjoy working out, so there might be times you see me at Wegmans, or on the street while I'm wearing my gym clothing. I also want to get to know all of you. I want to know what you think of your community. I love knowing what makes people tick. I want to know what you love about living here and what we could do better. How do you think the Beth El community can fully live up to its potential?

It really is strange to be back in Rochester, but it is a wonderful surprise. Because we never know what to expect in life, it's helpful to return to the beginning occasionally. That's the basis of our approach to the High Holidays.

Given the fact that everything around us is constantly in flux, returning to the familiarity of our tradition can be helpful in recentering ourselves. The New Year represents the hope of starting over. It's a time for reflection and improvement, compassion, and reassessing our priorities. The High Holidays is a time to think and to ask ourselves if we are living the life that we want. In his book, "A Purpose Driven Church," Pastor Rick Warren writes that each house of worship should run their programming based on how they view their purpose. If a church or shul is particularly dedicated to adult education, they might have a lot of different classes. If a synagogue is motivated by the desire for social activism, their calendar should reflect that as well.

The question to ask ourselves is this. Are we leading a life that reflects our values? Does our calendar reflect our personal priorities? How much time do we spend on Facebook, watching T.V., or blindly surfing the web? We all know that there are other things that we could be doing with our time to make it more worthwhile but we rarely "calendar" them. Maybe there is a hobby that you have always wanted to take up. If you find yourself talking about social justice and action, now is the time to build that into your schedule.

When we think about our lives, we can tell ourselves a story, but sometimes it's what we want to believe and not what is actually true. If we look at how we spend our time, how we treat people when we're stressed, we'll have a better picture of whether or not we're living the life we want.

I would love to welcome you to explore these questions during the high holiday season. Perhaps join us for a class as we explore these issues, or maybe even drop me an email and we can meet for coffee to talk about whatever you'd like. I look forward to meeting all of you, either within the walls of Beth El, or maybe even bumping into you at Wegmans. May it be a happy and sweet new year for us all, for our friends and loved ones, and may it be a year of healing and peace for all of *am Yisrael*.

FROM RABBI BITRAN'S DESK

Shanah Tovah U'metukah,

I am writing my last High Holy

Day article as Temple Beth El Senior Rabbi.

Our temple is undergoing a significant leadership transition as I retire in July 2026. Rabbi Ben Goldstein, our New Senior Rabbi, is already leading our day-to-day operation and religious services to ensure a smooth succession. He is our *Mara D'Atra*, meaning "Master of the Place." As the Rabbi holding halachic (Jewish legal) authority, he interprets Jewish law and decides ritual observance for Temple members. I will continue to be Temple Beth El's Rabbi and share most of my rabbinic duties with Rabbi Goldstein until July 2026.

A new Senior Rabbi will bring changes and improvements, selecting a new path for our Temple. More than ever, I invite you to participate in services and activities designed for personal reflection and spiritual growth as the High Holy Days approach.

To enhance your observance of the High Holy Days, I ask you to consider the following concepts:

1. Teshuvah (Return/Repentance): The Courage to Begin Again

"The gates of repentance are always open—but you must take the first step." The High Holy Days experience asks each of us: Who are you becoming? Teshuvah isn't about guilt; it's about growth. Every regret can become the root of renewal if we face it honestly. We return not just to God, but to the truest version of ourselves.

2. Tefillah (Prayer): The Voice that Seeks

"Out of the narrow place I called to God, and God answered me with expansiveness." – Psalm 118:5

Prayer during the *Yamim Nora'im* (Days of Awe) is not just recitation—it is reckoning. It is lifting the self beyond the ego, a yearning for something greater. Even doubt is part of the dialogue. What matters is not perfect belief but the act of showing up.

3. Tzedakah (Justice/Acts of Loving kindness): Repairing the Breach

"Justice, justice shall you pursue." – Deuteronomy 16:20 To enter the New Year with integrity, we must confront the brokenness of our world. Tzedakah is not optional generosity—it's a sacred responsibility. Ask: Who have I overlooked? Who needs uplifting? This is holy work. Act now!

4. Memory and Mortality: The Shofar's Cry

"Who shall live and who shall die?" – *Unetaneh Tokef* (*Mahzor pp. 143*) The liturgy is raw and honest: life is fragile. The Shofar awakens us to this truth. But mortality is not meant to paralyze—it is intended to prioritize. We ask: What matters most? What legacy will I leave?

5. Forgiveness:

A Path, Not a Moment

"Forgive us, pardon us, grant us atonement."
Forgiveness is a process—sometimes slow, often painful.
We seek forgiveness from others, ourselves, and God. But
we must also offer it, or we carry the weight into the new
year. Letting go is a form of freedom.

6. Renewal and Hope:

A Blank Page

"Hayom harat olam—Today the world is born." (Mahzor pp.158) Rosh Hashanah is not only the anniversary of creation—it's a chance to recreate ourselves. No matter the past, today we begin again. A new year. A new page with infinite possibilities.

I hope to see you in shul and wish you a Shanah Tovah, a good New Year, and a Hatimah Tovah. May you be inscribed and sealed in the Book of Life.

On behalf of my wife Silvana and our children Ethan and Lara, I wish you a *Shanah Tovah Tikatevu v'tichatemu*.

FROM THE YOUTH & FAMILY DIRECTOR

Shalom,

We are coming off an incredibly successful summer at Camp Keshet where we were able to engage a wide variety of early childhood families.

I write this article with such a sense of pride and excitement, as this will be our first school year as a New York State licensed preschool. Our teachers are now gaining access to some of the highest quality early childhood education training available. Families who may need financial assistance can now apply to New York State. We are exploring adding an afternoon program which would only strengthen our already successful preschool program. The integrity, warmth, and high-quality Jewish Early Childhood Education will remain the same.

Last year, we received a grant from the Jewish Federation of Greater Rochester to pilot a program called "STEAM with Yeladim." We partnered with Congregation Beth Shalom to bring the Rochester Museum and Science Center to Temple Beth El. This three-part series helped children in science while exploring the Jewish values behind the scientific concepts. We have a full calendar of Early Childhood Programs to engage the families of our youngest congregants. This fall, Tot Shabbat will return on a monthly basis, along with monthly programming including apple picking on Sept. 14 and learning about Parshat Noach at the Seneca Park Zoo on Oct. 26. I look forward to seeing your families at these events, as well as during the High Holy Days season at services geared toward our Early Childhood population.

FROM THE CONGREGATIONAL LEARNING DIRECTOR

Shalom,

The education team here at Temple Beth El fosters meaningful connections between the local Jewish community and Jewish practice in order to enrich our lives and further the continuance of Am Yisrael. We achieve this by providing varied quality educational opportunities for Temple Beth El members and the larger Jewish community.

As Director of Congregational Learning, I strive to inspire Jews of all ages to deepen their understanding of Judaism.

Our BE.WISE program offers a comprehensive religious school experience with family holiday events, Tikkun Olam trips and student-led Shabbat services several times a year. In the year before Kindergarten, we welcome students to participate in our BE.WISE Junior program about twice a month to build joy and familiarity around Jewish community, basic Jewish concepts, and the Aleph Bet.

As students enter Kindergarten in BE.WISE, they attend Sunday classes with the aim of advancing their knowledge of Hebrew holiday symbols, blessingings, and Hebrew letters. Students begin attending class twice a week from third through seventh grade. Classes will focus on using Hebrew literacy to unlock Shabbat prayers, basic modern Hebrew while also learning about the Parsha, Jewish peoplehood and Israel. At the beginning of seventh grade, students begin B'nei Mitzvah prep and Holocaust Studies courses in addition to engaging in learning together as a chevruta as part of a B'nei Mitzvah Cohort.

From eighth through twelfth grade, our students are invited to join our dual learning and leading Madrichim program. These students split their time between learning in Hebrew High School cohorts and working or volunteering with students in BE.WISE classrooms. Teens get the opportunity to develop valuable skills as Jewish leaders and mentors while deepening their own learning around Jewish topics that most interest them.

Learning is for everyone! Our adult education programs offer deep text learning through Rabbi-led series, casual Jewish discovery discussions during our monthly Torah On Tap pub crawls and the opportunity to hear special presentations from a variety of Jewish community leaders. Join us for Parsha study after Shabbat services during our Kiddush lunch and learn or Zoom in for weekly Haftarah class. We hope to see you soon!

BE.WISE:

BE.WISE, (Beth El wisdom, identity, spirit, education) offers quality supplementary Jewish education for students in grades Kindergarten through seventh grade, and offers Madrichim programs for students in eighth grade and high school. New this year, we also offer BE.WISE Junior for Pre-K students. Core courses focus on building Hebrew literacy while building connections to Hebrew language, Jewish peoplehood, Israel, Jewish history, Tanakh, Tefillah and the chagim. Elective classes change frequently with offerings including Judaism through Art, Jewish Music and Cafe Ivrit.

Temple Beth El's teen programming is dedicated to curating enjoyable, relevant and thought-provoking experiences for Jewish teenagers. We strive to facilitate teen connections to Judaism on their own terms while building a youth community where our participants can feel comfortable being their authentic selves.

Throughout the year, monthly USY youth group programs have students engage in various programs that help them to gain new perspectives on Jewish practice, Jewish peoplehood and Tikkun Olam projects that give back to the local community. In addition to USY programs, we regularly partner with other local and regional synagogues for new and exciting experiences that expand Jewish social circles. Jewish teenagers join from across the community to gather together for Havdalah services, hands-on social action initiatives and fun bonding experiences like laser tag, a chocolate Pesach seder and celebrating Purim on a limo party bus! Israeli teenagers on their ShinShin year of service regularly join our youth for celebration, learning and exposing them to Israeli culture. We also have Shabbaton overnight programs for teenagers over the course of the year so that students can have extended opportunities for socializing, learning and bonding before joining Shabbat prayer services.

Teenagers at our BE.WISE Religious School program have the opportunity to join our hybrid Madrichim/Hebrew High School program. Students in eighth through twelfth grades have the opportunity to come on Sunday mornings throughout the school year to volunteer or get paid compensation for being assistant teachers (madrichim) in our BE.WISE classes. Teenagers work 1:1 or in small groups with students in the classroom to inspire passion for learning and advance Judaic skills such as Hebrew literacy and prayer knowledge. During the other part of their Sundays, teenagers come together for higher Judaic learning and choose from a host of subjects to deepen their understanding of, and connection to, Jewish community and Jewish practice.

In the lead up to our eighth-twelfth grade USY and Madrichim programs, students in sixth-eighth grades have the opportunity to engage in Middle School youth group programs. These include Havdalah services and holiday events, fun outings around town and a day trip to visit another Jewish community. This past year, our Middle School students joined youth from other synagogues around Rochester to visit Toronto's Jewish Community, which included a visit to the Holocaust Museum and other centers of Jewish life around Toronto.

In the year leading up to their B'nei Mitzvah ceremonies, students becoming B'nei Mitzvah gather monthly as part of a B'nei Mitzvah cohort for bonding, support and learning. The community that our B'nei Mitzvah families and students build, along with the Jewish experiences that we foster for them, helps to create a meaningful, fun and supportive environment for students to connect to their Judaism. This cohort strengthens the B'nei Mitzvah experience and sets up relationships that these families can continue to foster throughout the rest of Middle School and beyond.


